


Research of possible colonial collection contexts at the Bavarian State Library, Munich



Oriental and Asian collections of the Bavarian State Library

Numbers:

- 600,000 printed volumes in the original language
- 20,000 manuscripts
- from North Africa, the Near and Middle East, Central, South, Southeast and East Asia

History:

- 1558: Purchase of the private library of the Orientalist Johann Albrecht Widmanstetter (1506–1557)
- 17th century: books reached Europe via traders, travellers and Christian missionaries
- Abolition of the Jesuit order in 1773 and secularisation of the Bavarian monasteries in 1803
- 19th century: systematic expansion of the Oriental and Asian collections

Provenance research

Search for items disowned or looted during the time of the Nazi regime


Since 2021:

Research on the collections' history was expanded to include the Oriental and Asian collections

- Purpose: identify and document possible colonial collection context
- Focus rather on entire collection segments

Sub-collections in focus

 Tibetan collection of the zoologist <u>Ernst Schäfer (1910–1992)</u>, brought from central Asia to Munich by the German Tibet expedition of 1938/39



• Convolute of Yemeni manuscripts from the collection of the Italian voyager <u>Giuseppe Caprotti</u> (1862–1919) purchased in 1902 through the agency of the Orientalist <u>Eduard Glaser</u> (1855–1908)







Sub-collections in focus

- Acquisitions of around 2,800 manuscripts of the Yao ethnicity, included in the library's holdings only starting in the 1980s
- Several hundred <u>Old South Arabic minuscule inscriptions on wood</u> <u>sticks</u> in the Sabaean language from the time up to the sixth century AD

 Acquisition journey of <u>Georg Reismüller</u> (1882–1936) to China, Japan and Korea in 1928/29







Procedure

 Evaluation of available records and documents, e.g. personal papers and other archival sources, repertories ...

Reismüller's journey to East Asia (1928/29)

Bavarian State Library's task should be "to ensure the temporary provision of the study materials, especially books, necessary for the operation of Chinese studies in Munich."

werhältniemässig wenig aktive Geschichte zurück. Im 17. und 18.

Jahrhundert waren verschiedene bayerische Jesuiten im Dienste der katholischen Mission in China tätig und vermittelten Kenntniese über Ostasien sowäe Bücher und kunstgewerblich-ethnographische Gegenstände nach München, wo sie noch heute in den einschlägigen Sammlungen sufbewahrt werden. Vor 100 Jahren begann die bayerische Gymnasiallehrer und spätere Professor des Chinasischen und Armenischen an der Universität München, Karl Friedrich N e um ann, seine chinasischen Studien, die ihn schliesslich zu einer wissenschaftlichen Reise nach Südchina (Macao und Kanton) führten, wo er für die Stastsbibliotheken in München und Berlin eine Bücheresmulung erwarb, die heute noch den Grundstock für die chinesischen Abteilungen der beiden Bibliotheken bildet.

Unterbrochene Entwicklung

Während aber in Berlin die chinesischen Sammlungen und ich Zuesamenhang damit die Chinakunde im Lauf der vergangenen 100 Jahre sich kräftig entwickelten, blieben sie in München, von einigen bemerkenswerten Anläufen und Erwerbungen abgesehen, in der Entwickelung stecken. In the mid-1920s, Reismüller submitted concrete plans to the library management and the Bavarian Ministry for Education to expand the library's Chinese collection:

"... to expand the Chinese collection of the Bavarian State Library, a considerable sum should be made available by the state or from another source to purchase the necessary additions, 2. the additional purchases should be made locally, i.e. in East Asia (China and possibly Japan), 3. the necessary trip there lasting several months is undertaken and financially secured."



"Based on the experience gained on the spot and on the basis of the list of desiderata I brought from Europe and supplemented during the trip, the book purchases began on a large scale, for which the Shanghainese supplied the material in well-equipped old book stores, although not as knowledgeable as in Beijing." (Reismüller 1930) "I rummaged around the bookstores, having the works selected from the catalogs presented to me in order to examine them for content and appearance, a laborious and time-consuming task as one had to leaf through volume after volume to make sure that there were no leaves missing, that the individual pages are well printed in wood block printing and that the bookworm, who seems to particularly enjoy the beautiful, soft Chinese paper, has not caused any havoc. Since there were many hundreds of volumes, I sat over this work for many hours. In addition, there were different prices in individual bookstores for one and the same work, where there could be a difference of up to 50%. So I ran from one store to the other, checked and compared the price and quality of the items I wanted, left again, came back until I finally finished the deal."

(from a letter to a friend, 20. Februar 1929)

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"Finally, to touch on the numerical result of my East Asian book acquisitions, I was able to collect a total of around 18,500 books, a figure that I myself had not expected. This means an increase in the East Asian department of the State Library by more than 150%. It therefore reaches an impressive number of around 30,000 volumes." (from a letter to Generaldirektor Schnorr von Carolsfeld, 2. Juni 1929)

Reismüller made use of

- bookstores and antiquarian bookshops
- presumably also auction houses
- a wide range of local contacts

Freely accessible Chinese book market -> Reismüller was able to expand the Munich collection in a considerate and comprehensive manner.

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Results

Search for information and evaluation: very time-consuming and sometimes quite

fruitless.

However: There are results.



Results

- Investigation of serveral sub-collections completed: provenances of the examined collections unsuspicious on the basis of the available material
- Regarding the provenances and acquisition contexts of the books purchased in East Asia by Reismüller: unsuspicious picture, free from relationship of dependency that might characterise acquisitions in colonial contexts (-> no significant power imbalance between seller and buyer)
