

ARTICLE I.

MARRIAGE, AFFINITY, AND INHERITANCE IN CHINA.

Althorous so much has been written upon China and the Chinese, t is really surprising, that even we, who live in the country, are so lightly acquainted with "that which before us lies in daily life;"

slightly acquainted with "that which before us lies in daily life;" and perhaps on no one of their many ceremonies and observances are we less informed than on those relating to Marriage and Inbestance. Both Sir John Davis, in his work ensured the Chinese, and Dr Williams, in his Middle Kingelous, have entered somewhat fully into the subject of marriage and sundry anonymous papers have appeared upon the control of the control of the control of the pens of other authors; but these have generally been confined to imple descriptions of the formalities observed at weddings, or to notices of the general bearings of the institution upon society at large. No definite or correct view can be gathered from any of them as to the legal requirements or conditions of marriage and, as regards the dependent subject of heirship or marriage, they are sarrly, or altogether, silent.
